Re: Amendment #10 to S.2545, Peak Rate Options to Reduce Customer Costs and Lower Overall Peak Demand

Dear Senators:

The twenty-five undersigned organizations are writing in support of Amendment #10 to S.2545, titled "Peak Rate Options to Reduce Customer Costs and Lower Overall Peak Demand," filed by Majority Leader Cynthia Creem.

Over the past decade, Massachusetts has had success ramping up overall energy efficiency investments and promoting the development of renewable energy. While these programs have successfully provided peak demand reductions, it is clear that there are additional opportunities to address these peaks that drive so much of the Commonwealth's energy costs. Adoption and promotion of optional on-peak/off-peak rates, as required by Amendment #10, is an important way of providing improved incentives for ratepayers to manage peak demand through a wide variety of methods, including management of energy usage, advanced energy storage, smarter energy efficiency investment, local clean energy generation such as solar, and electric vehicle charging at off-peak times.

Unlike previous options in Massachusetts, Amendment #10 includes requirements to educate customers about this new optional rate and make it easy for customers to sign up. Such a program of optional on-peak/off-peak rates does not require smart meters, but Amendment #10 does provide for a potential transition to opt-out time-varying rates if approved by the Department of Public Utilities, and appropriate consideration and protection of low-income ratepayers.

Eversource currently offers this type of rate in Connecticut and National Grid offers this type of rate in New York. Massachusetts residents should be offered the same opportunities and incentives to reduce peak demand and lower overall electricity system costs.
